



## CPCCLDG3001A Licence to perform dogging

### Course Information

#### Objective

This course covers the skills and knowledge required to perform slinging techniques safely, including the selection and inspection of lifting gear and/or the directing of the crane operator in the movement of the load when the load is out of view of the crane/operator for licensing purposes.

A person performing this work is required to hold a Dogging high-risk work (HRW) licence (DG).

This is a nationally recognised training course and successful completion will lead to the issuance of a Statement of Attainment in CPCCLDG3001A.

#### Who should attend

This course is suitable for individuals who are required to carry out dogging activities in their workplace and who require the High-Risk Work Licence for Dogging.

#### Pre requisites

There are no pre-requisites units required for enrolment in this course.

Candidates must be 18 or over at commencement of this course.

#### Licensing/Regulatory information

This unit is based on the National Standard for Licensing Persons Performing High Risk Work. On successful completion of this unit you will receive a Dogging (DG) High Risk Work Licence which will be issued by Worksafe WA. #### Language, literacy and numeracy (LLN) requirements

Successful completion of this course requires you to have reasonable levels of language, literacy and numeracy (LLN) ability. Specifically, you are required to possess the following foundation skills:

- Language skills to use and interpret vocabulary specific to dogging operations and workplace procedures to communicate with other workplace personnel, use nonverbal feedback (hand signals and whistles) to support effective communication, and use relevant two way radio conventions.
- Literacy (reading) skills to interpret documentation that includes legislation, Australian Standards, technical specifications, operation manuals and manufacture's specifications; workplace procedures and emergency procedures; and workplace signage, tags and labels.
- Literacy (written) skills to accurately record and maintain information relating to dogging including incident reports, inspections and maintenance records.
- Numeracy skills to interpret numerical information including rated capacity and working load limit tags, and calculating rated capacity of lifting equipment.
- Employment skills to safely move loads in conjunction with cranes including the reading of tags, slinging, loading, directing and landing loads with a slewing mobile crane with a telescopic boom and a winch, in and out of sight of the crane/operator, moving four loads of varying shapes, sizes and weights; and to conduct pre and post operational checks of lifting equipment.
- Self-management skills to implement risk controls and to initiate emergency management strategies.

Samples of the course and math's requirements are covered in our pre-enrolment materials and are available from our Administration team.

**Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL)**

RPL is available for this unit. For more information contact our Administration team regarding eligibility.

**Estimated duration**

5 days of approx. 8 hours per day (usually Monday to Friday)  
Days can be varied for on-site course delivery.

**Expected mode of delivery**

This course is conducted via face-to-face workshop in an on-the-job or off-the-job environment. Learners participate in class room based theory presentation and discussion, learning and assessment before undertaking practice opportunities followed by practical assessments. All theory and practical learning and assessment activities are completed within the workshops. There is no pre-reading, external course work or work placements required.

**Assessment**

All assessments are carried out using assessment instruments and instructions endorsed by Worksafe WA. A written and oral WorkSafe WA assessment must be completed before a practical assessment comprising the above elements is completed. The assessment activities include the following:

- Theory knowledge test
- Calculations assessment
- Performance of 5 practical activities including:
  - Hazard identification and risk control measures
  - Inspection and isolation of defective equipment
  - Communicating with other personnel in the team
  - Moving of loads
  - Bends and hitches

**Course Content**

The course covers the following skills and knowledge which are essential for demonstrating competence in this unit.

**Required skills:**

The course covers the following required skills:

- Communication techniques in the workplace including whistles, hand signals and use of fixed channel two-way radio
- Communication skills at a level sufficient to communicate with other site personnel
- Calculate rated capacity of lifting equipment
- Apply different methods for making temporary connections to loads using fibre and synthetic ropes
- Ability to interpret rated capacity and working load limit tags
- Hazard identification and control
- Slings techniques
- Selection and inspection for lifting equipment
- Directing crane operations in the moving of loads in a safe manner, using a slewing crane
- Inspection and care of a wide range of lifting equipment to appropriate Australian Standards and/or manufacturer's specifications

**Required knowledge:**

The course covers the following required knowledge:

- Appropriate mathematical procedures for estimation and measurement of loads
- Basic knowledge of types of cranes and their functions
- Commonwealth, state or territory OHS legislation, standards and codes of practice relevant to the full range of techniques of undertaking dogging activities
- Load stability and safety factors in line with manufacturer's specifications
- Types of lifting equipment and slinging techniques for use, and their limitations and performance in a wide range of conditions (including but not limited to slings, beams, accessories, clamps, work-boxes, bins and pallets)
- Understanding of the hierarchy of control

**Frequently asked questions**

*Q. Can I do this course in my workplace?*

A. This course can be delivered at TPS or at a worksite. On-site training and assessment must be organised through a workplace supervisor to ensure that all the required materials and a suitable working area is made available to suit the assessment and workplace. All assessment will be conducted under standard and authorised work practices, safety requirements and environmental constraints. Contact our Administration team for more information.
